DEPARTMENT OF LAW

The Faculty of Law is the place where students are taught about the rules of the current order and the system in which these rules are involved, as well as the discussions on what is needed for justice. For this purpose, classical subjects that have been included in the curriculum have been taught for a long time, and many elective courses in English and Turkish are included in the curriculum in accordance with the new developments and interests of the students.

At the Faculty of Law, the duration of study is 4 years. The classical method of education is used as the teaching method. However, practical studies are also being carried out for practical purposes. Students have the opportunity to work with real events in propria persona, especially in the elective courses "Law Practices" and "Arbitration Legal Clinic".

In our faculty, various conferences, seminars, career days, fictional sessions, and notably an orientation program are held especially for freshmen.

In addition, we have master and doctoral education programs within the Institute of Social Sciences. Having very young and dynamic academic staff, our faculty has been a source for the formation of many foundation universities around. The faculty instructors lecture at many different universities, support legislative activities in law commissions, and serve the scientific world with their numerous publications simultaneously.

The medium of instruction is Turkish at the Department of Law. Education is based on the pass/fail grading system. An absolute grading system is applied. Vocational English, Vocational German and Vocational French electives are also available.



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
